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FROM OSKAR EUSTIS

Dear Friends,

A RAISIN IN THE SUN is one of the greatest and most important American plays ever written. More than that, it is a play that grows in majesty, truth, and brilliance as the decades pass. Written the year before I was born, it sounds (especially in Robert O'Hara's brilliant production) as if it was written yesterday, or tomorrow—it is still that relevant, that prescient. Watching it is an exhilarating, dizzying experience: joy at the power of Hanberry's art, grief at the immense damage that racism has done to the Younger family, gratitude for the introduction to these extraordinary characters, fear that in the almost 65 years since RAISIN debuted, we have solved none of the deep, systemic problems Hansberry lays bare.

Hansberry herself was the product of complications as dialectical as America itself. Her father was a landlord who grew wealthy off of breaking up apartments into small kitchenettes, such as the Younger family's home. He was also a fierce crusader for racial equality who consistently challenged racist laws. She was a lesbian at a time when queer culture was almost entirely underground; she was a Marxist and a communist who was startlingly free of dogmatic thinking. The more time I spend with RAISIN, the clearer it becomes what we lost when she died at the dreadfully young age of 34.

She was a radical, she was an artist, she was a force to be reckoned with.

Robert O'Hara has been working on RAISIN for years, including at the Williamstown Theater Festival under the astute leadership of Mandy Greenfield in 2019. I am thrilled that he has continued his exploration of this seminal work at The Public. We tend not to do revivals; however we now feel the deep need to listen to the voices of Hansberry and James Baldwin (whose brilliant mind and insights are at the center of yet another show this fall, Elevator Repair Service's Baldwin and Buckley at Cambridge). **They were prophets, understanding our time better than we could,** even though they are long passed.

Robert has assembled an amazing cast and design team, who have brought Hansberry's play to beautiful, stunning life. I am so grateful to them for sharing this searing piece of theater with us.

THE PUBLIC THEATER continues the work of its visionary founder Joe Papp as a civic institution engaging, both on stage and off, with some of the most important ideas and social issues of today. Conceived over 60 years ago as one of the nation's first nonprofit theatres, The Public has long operated on the principles that theatre is an essential cultural force and that art and culture belong to everyone. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Oskar Eustis and Executive Director Patrick Willingham, The Public's wide breadth of programming includes an annual season of new work at its landmark home at Astor Place, Free Shakespeare in the Park at The Delacorte Theater in Central Park, the Mobile Unit touring throughout New York City's five boroughs, Public Forum, Under the Radar, Public Lab, Public Works, Public Shakespeare Initiative and Joe's Pub. Since premiering *Hair* in 1967, The Public continues to create the canon of American theatre and is currently represented on Broadway by the Tony Award-winning musical Hamilton by Lin-Manuel Miranda. by her former husband and literary executor Robert Nemiroff, was produced in 1969. Hansberry's writings also include *The Sign in Sidney Brustein's Window, Les Blancs, The Drinking Gourd, What Use Are Flowers?* and *The Movement.* The Lorraine Hansberry Papers are located at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture in New York City. lhlt.org

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CONVERSATION

WITH LORRAINE HANSBERRY

Playwright Lorraine Hansberry discusses her play "A Raisin in the Sun" with American broadcaster, actor, writer, and historian Studs Terkel on WMFT radio

Original air date: May 12, 1959

STUDS TERKEL A question is often, I'm sure, is asked [of] you many times. You may be tired of it. Someone comes up to you and says, "This is not really a Negro play, 'A Raisin in the Sun.'" I'm sure you've been told this many—what's your reaction? They say, "This is a play about anybody. Now what do you say?"

LORRAINE HANSBERRY That's an excellent question because invariably this has been the point of reference. People are trying—I know what they're trying to say. What they're trying to say, and mistakenly as a matter of fact, which I'll speak about, what they're trying to say is that this is not what they consider the traditional treatment of the Negro in the theater. They're trying to say that it isn't a propaganda play. That it isn't a protest play—

STUDS TERKEL No message play.

LORRAINE HANSBERRY And that it isn't something that hits you over the head, and the other remarks, which have become cliches themselves, as a matter of fact, in discussing this kind of material. So what they're trying to say is something very good. They're trying to say that they believe that the characters in our play transcend category. However, it's an unfortunate way to try and do it because I believe that one of the most sound ideas in dramatic variety is that in order to create the universal you must pay very great attention to the specific. In other words, I've told people that not only is this a Negro family, specifically and definitely culturally, but it's not even a New York family or a Southern Negro family. It is specifically South Side Chicago. That kind of care, that kind of attention to the detail of reference and so forth. In other words, I think people will, to the extent they accept them and believe them as who they're supposed to be, to that extent they can become everybody. So I was—it's definitely a Negro play before it's anything else.

STUDS TERKEL The universality itself is italicized when you say something specific about a specific human being or a group of human beings as you did here.
